
Our aim for the week was to help our children know they have the

Music Matters

What a busy term! The young musicians at Adderley have been enjoying their music lessons, singing in Worship, learning to play instruments with our visiting music tutors, coming to Music Clubs and attending Young Voices in Birmingham.

Oak class have been learning some new notes on the recorder and getting really good at writing down rhythms and reading music. They've also been exploring Viking folk songs and using one of their favourites called ' My Mother Told Me' to help them create, rehearse, and perform their own Viking Song. 
















Afro Beat band made us all jump up and dance. We have also started to read music by following a score to add body percussion to 'Twinkle Twinkle Little Star.'
